Our School Counsellor, Mrs Rose Quinn, supports all our students in numerous ways throughout the year. As well as individual counselling sessions, Mrs Quinn provides ongoing information talks for parents and students. The presentation on Third Level Options including the HEAR and DARE schemes was very well attended by LC1 and LC2 students and parents.

Mrs Quinn accompanied students to the Higher Options Career Exhibition in the RDS where there was an opportunity to meet representatives from colleges in the UK and Europe.

She also spoke to Third Year and TY students and parents on subject and programme options for senior cycle 2017. This talk supplemented research already done in class with the students by Mrs Quinn.

Students travelled to Options West Career Exhibition in Galway and met representatives from Irish colleges and universities as well as representatives from SOLAS (apprenticeships) and Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses. They acquired information on apprenticeships, studying in Europe, nursing in UK as well as careers with An Garda Síochána.

Mrs Quinn has organised speakers from third level colleges including NUIG, AIT, GMIT, Sligo IT, UL and Dublin Universities to visit the school and meet with senior students. Paul McDonald, National Road Authority, will speak later in the term about exciting careers in the area of Engineering and Science. In collaboration with NUIG, Mrs Quinn has organized a "Transitioning to Third Level" information talk.
